They also presented each homeowner a \$1,000 gift certificate to Tate Furniture to help furnish the new home.

Volunteers from the community also joined the Nissan build, including Mayor Arnel Bolden, Canton High School, Canton Municipal Utilities, Chapel of the Cross, Latin American Business Association, Madison County Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Madison-Ridgeland Rotary Club, Madison United Methodist Church, Rho Xi Lambda Chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity; Upsilon Upsilon Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Ross & Yerger and Yates Services. "Habitat is one of our most valued community partners," said Gibb, the Canton manufacturing plant has built a total of eight Habitat homes, four in Canton and four in Jackson. They have also donated two Nissan NV trucks for use by the local Habitat

Nissan's national partnership with Habitat began in response to hurricanes Katrina and Rifa in 2005. 

not be offering any large animal services except for a very limited equine practice.





Make it the season to donate blood

'Tis the season...it is several seasons, in fact: flu season, deer season, the holiday season — one of the busiest and most hectic seasons of the year. It is a time of traditions, too: family gatherings, winter vacations, cold weather sporting events and hunting. Those traditions include high travel and risks for accidents, a time when the need for blood tends to go up. It's also a time, traditionally speaking, when blood donations drop because of the flu, the weather and the hectic time of year.

There is little anyone can do about flu. Take precautions, yes; but, if donors have the flu, they need to stay home and get well. They can't, and shouldn't, come in and donate blood. It's bad for the donor, and it's bad for the patient. It's not good for the blood center staff, either. However, the flu does take a toll on the number of donors blood centers see during the winter months starting in December, and Mississippi Blood Services (MBS) is no exception. MBS relies more on those who are healthy to come in and donate. Because of flu season, the donor base has dropped. The onset of flu season coincides with winter, which is another reason for blood shortages this time of year.

Winter weather is always a good excuse to stay home. It's cold outside and no one wants to get out to

donate blood. But when ice storms strikes (as they do even in Mississippi) blood drives get canceled, and donors cannot get out to donate, even if they want to. MBS needs donors to donate prior to forecasted severe weather hitting, so that the shelves are full; that way when threatening

weather does come, the impact is not as critical. Being prepared is the best defense against the worst weather catastrophes.

It should be noted that typical winter weather rarely keeps shoppers home, and MBS has community blood drives set up for the convenience of those who are out and about doing their holiday shopping. The MBS Donor Coaches are located where they can be easily accessed by people

who are already braving the weather. It will take time from your schedule, but you will help someone in need this holiday season. If you think about it, it may be your donation that will allow a Mississippi patient to celebrate the

holidays, period. Now, that's an awesome gift! Isn't it worth a little of your time?

Time - there just doesn't seem to be enough of it. Yes, holiday schedules and the hunting season demand a lot of people's time, and

time is a scarce commodity. Days are shortest in December, and it seems the weeks just rush by between October 31 and December 24. Often, people get caught up in the hustle and bustle, thinking there is so much to do. Everything requires planning, taking care of this, getting that done, there aren't enough hours to stop and donate blood. It takes too long. But, for most donors, it takes about an hour. Isn't helping to save a life worth an

hour of your time?

Consider it this way: it's an hour that will give someone else a lifetime. It's a piece of you that will help make another whole. It's that one element that is the difference between life and death. It's the gift of time, the promise of the future, the hope of spending more time with loved ones, the best present you will ever give another—the gift of life. Yes, that really is an incredible gift.

Mississippi Blood Services is asking donors to make a new holiday tradition this year: donate blood. Brave the weather, set aside a little of your time, roll up your sleeve and help save someone's life. It's not just a unit of blood. There's a patient depending on you—someone's parent, spouse or sibling -- a patient who is someone's child. Make this holiday season just a little bit brighter because you gave someone another chance to celebrate life. After all, it is the season of celebrations.

How to care for your child with a cold

A cold is an infection caused by viruses, that usually lasts 7-10 days, and

gets better on its own. Your child may experience a stuffy, runny nose, coughing, congestion, minor aches and pains, and low-grade fever. The

color of nasal discharge is clear at first, then becomes thick yellow-green after three days, then turns clear again on days 5-7 and then dries up. The color of the nasal discharge does not indicate a bacterial sinus infection.

There are several things you can do to help your child. Use a vaporizer or a humidifier by your child's bedside until the stuffiness in the nose is cleared. Be sure to keep the water and filter clean in the machine. You do not have to add vapor medicine, etc.

Encourage your child to blow his/her nose. In a younger infant you may use a nose pump along with saline spray ,available over the counter.

Keep your child in an upright position when he/she sleeps. Raise the head side of the bed or propping on 1-2 pillows. Younger infants can be put to sleep sitting upright in the car seat. Be sure to strap them in securely.


Avoid dust and smoke exposures which can cause cough and cold symptoms. So absolutely no smoking in the house.


Keep your child well-hydrated with plenty of fluids such as juice, water and milk. They may not have an appetite for solid foods until the cold starts to get better.

Keep check on your child's temperature, and keep it down with Tylenol or Advil, etc.

If your child's cold does not go away after two weeks, or if he/she runs a high-grade fever - more than 102 degrees F for more than two days, then bring the child in to seek medical help for evaluation.

Hours of operation at the Canton Post Office are M-F 8:00 am-4:30 pm and on Saturdays from 9:00a m-11:00 am.

There will be extended hours at the locations highlighted on two Saturdays, Dec. 12 and 19, leading up to Christmas Day. These offices will provide full retail services, including stamp sales and package acceptance

The Postal Service predicts Monday, Dec. 14, will be the busiest mailing and shipping day for holiday packages, letters and cards. That same day is also expected to be the Postal Service's busiest day online, with more than 7 million customers predicted to visit usps.com.

Monday, Dec. 21, is expected to be

the busiest delivery day for holiday packages, cards, and letters. The Postal Service anticipates more than 30 million packages alone will be delivered just that day.



Bill Mosby has served as the pharmacist at Mosby Drug Store for 43 years. He is the fourth generation to

operate the store, after his two great uncles started the business in 1843 and his great grandfather joined in the 1850's.

The old store was on the Square where his uncle, Ott Noble, had a shop with Joe Watts Sr. called, appropriately, Noble Watts, which closed its doors in October after 68 years. Mosby built the current location on East Peace Street, at Highway 16 & 43, in 1998.

Mosby said he has always been and will continue to be a traditional drug store with an emphasis on pa-

tient care. As of November 1, the drug store has had a changing of the guard, so to speak. Will Mosby, Bill's son, is now manager of the store, and Stacey Cauthen Sanders, another Canton native, is the pharmacist-in-charge. The senior Mosby will continue to work two or three days a week.


